

THE WAY TO THE MARKO FEINGOLD STEG



Throughout his life, Marko Feingold, as president of the Jewish Community Salzburg, was renowned far beyond the city borders: he embodied Jewish life in Salzburg.

> Time and again, Marko Feingold has made public statements. His impish and ironic manner challenged his audience and frequently gave them food for thought.


The survivor of several concentration camps, Marko Feingold was much in demand as a witness of his age, inviting hundreds of school classes into the synagogue. He received numerous awards throughout his long life of 106 years.

> After his death on 19 September 2019, it quickly became clear that a permanent tribute should be paid to his achievements. When it was resolved to name a street after him, a hot debate was sparked off. The decision was taken in September 2020.

The Salzburg Municipal Council made a majority decision to re-name the Makartsteg bridge into Marko-Feingold-Steg.



DP HOTSPOT SALZBURG



The city and province of Salzburg became a centre for Jewish survivors after the war (DP = displaced person). They were accommodated in several camps.




01. Camp Beth Bialik 02. Camp Beth Trumpeldor

05. Camp Herz1 06. Camp Mülln 07. Camp Hellbrunn


TRANSIT CAMP AUGUSTINER BRÄU





In summer 1945, Camp Mülln was set up in the Augustiner Bräu brewery (Mülln Abbey). In contrast to other DP camps, most inmates here only stayed briefly.


LIFE GOES ON IN THE CAMP




The DP camp Beth Bialik (Klessheimer Allee) was a prisoner-of-war camp in the Nazi period. The former muster ground with the watchtower was still a reminder of this.




SCHOOL AT LAST





Jewish children who had survived had no idea what school was. School lessons were arranged for them in the DP camps. One of the main subjects was religion.


HOPE & LOVE




The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee even provided the Jewish survivors with canopies (chuppahs) for religious weddings.



TRAUMA & SUFFERING








Persecution, loss of family members, years of menace and intimidation – all this weighed heavily on the survivors. And a new form of suffering made matters worse: many children were too weak to survive.


NEW LIFE: SPORT & STRENGTH

BORN IN THE DP CAMP








Zehava Zarchi was born in the DP camp Riedenburg. The family emigrated to Israel in 1949. Recently she received the Austrian citizenship.

ZIONIST AGITATION



Prior to the foundation of the State of Israel, DPs demonstrated for free access to Palestine. Zionist organisations campaigned for this in the DP camps.








OPERATION LITTLE EXODUS
